What is a vision?

A vision is what we are aiming for in terms of our children's experience at Bollington Cross and the kind of people we want to send into the world. Our vision should be in line with the Church of England's vision for education with Jesus' promise of 'life in all its fullness' at its heart. (John 10:10)



Why have one? What should it do?

It's an exciting way to articulate what we are all about; what we want for our school community (not just pupils) and how we aim to deliver it. It provides clarity, direction and a supportive framework that we can utilise and reflect-on continuously.

- The vision is based in the Christian narrative it should sound very different from the vision of a community primary school and it needs to engage the whole community, not just the pupils.

- 2. School leadership and governors will need to be able to articulate the school vision and the theology behind it.
- 3. The Christian vision of your school should make a real difference. The church encourages schools to cultivate a vision that is unique to and effective for their communities and environments. It will form part of your identity and will go on to help the school make all important decisions about staffing, budget, training, after school provision etc. and of course the curriculum.

By the time children move on...

Children should leave school with a rich experience and understanding of Christianity, but we should also encourage children to dig into their own cultural depth as each school is to be a hospitable community that seeks to embody an ethos of living well together. Here, the flourishing of the pupils goes along with the flourishing of the teachers and other staff. Whilst high academic standards are paramount, the church equally recognises the following:

- Values as well as facts
- Ethics as well as education
- Wisdom as well as knowledge and skills

The SIAMS Evaluation Schedule has Seven Strands. These are complementary to each other and help to bring out clearly all the aspects of a Church School that the inspection covers.





What we did with it

We met and analysed the feedback, finding commonalities. This informed our own reflections which helped us to make the following summations.

We are the garden where a village with a shared heartbeat cultivates its seed. It is within the fabric of our nature that we have the strength to be vulnerable and when any of our diverse community 'look to the hills and ask, where does my help come from?' (Psalm 121: 1-2) The spirit of God shines through our people, rejoicing in our rich, interwoven history; nurturing deep, honest and supportive, life-long connections; and cultivating a future where we flourish and blossom (Hosea 14:7), leading all to live life in all its fulness (Mark 10:10 - CofE vision statement)

As a flourishing garden (Hosea 14:7) set amidst rolling hills (Psalm 121: 1-2), Bollington Cross is and seeks to be a joyful, open and hopeful community school, rooted in relationship and rooted in the Christian faith. We care for one another, seek the best for each other and nurture deep, honest and lasting connections, with the past and with one another. Together we lift our eyes, hopefully, to the future."

Supporting statement:



Our Christian values are the cornerstone of our ethos, and we don't just say it, we live it, nurturing deep, honest, and lasting connections whilst fostering academic, social and emotional, and spiritual growth. We rejoice in our rich interwoven history and cultivate a future where we may live life in all its fulness (John 10:10).

(The supporting statement is inspired by key summations and reflections from our feedback from children, staff, and parents as well as our previous vision and values. John 10:10 is the foundation for the Church of England's Vision for Education. It feels fitting and shows that we have been led by church's vision as well.)

As a result, our community has:

- 1. Honest and fair role-models who build positive relationships and encourage a healthy lifestyle through enriching experiences, rooted in challenge and curiosity.
- 2. Children with positive wellbeing who enjoy coming to school. With the support of our school values, children try their best in every situation so that they can develop key character strengths; a love for learning; and the drive to succeed independently and as part of a team.
- 3. An inclusive school environment inspired by our values, promoting kindness and respect for others and ourselves. We celebrate diversity; encourage one another's unique individuality; and find joy and appreciation in each part in our school's rich tapestry.

(We have compiled these three statements based on a combination of the new and previous vision and values as well as feedback from staff, children, parents, and governors. Since SIAMS state that the vision should inspire 'all that we do', we have moved towards more collective language with statements rooted in people and place.)

The more spiritual nuance is that Christians might believe that by exercising these values, we act as windows of God's love, allowing the Holy Spirit to work through us.


